

Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" *

Our knowledge of God is not out of date because we forget but because God is constantly adapting his support for us to suit developing circumstances. With every world event, good or bad, timeless scriptures become timely as they are reinterpreted.

124th Church Anniversary . . .

The Congregational Church in Chappel, now part of the United Reformed Church since 1972, opened on the 25th of August 1901.

It all began with nine local residents meeting together – to quote the Minutes of 18th April 1901:

'We the inhabitants of the village of Chappel acting on behalf of a general opinion prevailing in our midst, are of unanimous opinion that the time has come for the immediate commencement of definite Christian effort along Free Church lines in this place.'

The Chapel, formerly a builders' store was adapted and rented at first and bought in the 1920's and additions made.

Bee Lines



2025 will almost certainly be remembered as the year of the heatwave. Or rather heatwaves, as at time of writing I think there has already been four of them this summer, and still, plenty of time for another one or two.

A heatwave, apparently, is declared when the daily temperature remains above a certain high threshold for a defined period of time. Those of us old enough to remember the great heatwave of 1976 may recall that the temperature in London reached an almost unprecedented 35.1 degrees. By this year's standard, that seems almost like an ice-age.

If I recall rightly in 1976 there was also a prolonged drought, featuring almost nationwide hosepipe bans. From memory, the situation was so bad that a government minister, the then Minister for Sport, was appointed as a drought buster. Within a couple of days the heavens opened, breaking the drought and leading to the immediate hailing of Mr Denis Howell, the aforementioned minister, as our saviour. By doing absolutely nothing, our Denis achieved more in one day than he did in several years as Minister for Sport. That's politics for you. However, to return to the present day, the weather has once again caused some upheaval in the world of the bees.

Everything seemed to happen much earlier this year. The spring honey crop finished in mid May. Peak swarming season was late May to early June, but the timing of swarms is always variable; I have known it to be as early as April, and last year I was catching swarms in the garden in early August.

Locally the main summer honey crop always corresponds to the flowering of borage, as the bees will ignore all other sources of nectar, and gorge on borage as soon as it becomes available. This year, of course, was different. The drought of spring delayed the borage crop considerably. By the middle of July, when we are usually awash with borage, there was barely a blue flower to be seen in the fields. The bees were getting their nectar from other sources, but the honey yield was well down on previous years.

So this year the main crop honey, instead of featuring borage, was what beekeepers would refer to as a wildflower honey, in other words a honey derived from a wide mix of sources, which locally would include bramble, rose bay willow herb (both of which flowered early) and any nectar bearing plants you may have planted in your garden. So just when it appeared that the honey season had, to all intents and purposes, closed a few weeks early, there was to be one final twist to the story. Like a phoenix rising from the ashes of a drought ridden summer, a few fields of borage suddenly burst into bloom. Although several weeks later than usual, and much reduced in acreage from previous years, and yielding less nectar than usual due to the dry conditions, the bees were able to rise (or fly) to the occasion and produce just enough honey to turn the honey year from disastrous to just about adequate.

We now approach autumn, when the bees, with a little help from their keeper, will prepare for winter, the aim being to produce strong hives ready to hit the ground running next spring. Any honey from late flowering nectar bearing plants, mostly ivy, will be left for the bees as food to see them through the winter months. Hopefully next year will see a return to a more normal pattern of weather, although after the last few years, I don't think I would recognise a normal weather pattern if one jumped up and bit me! Onwards and upwards.

Nature notes

The big conversation over the summer has been over the recovery of insects generally and butterflies specifically. General conclusion seems to be that this was one-off bumper summer following a warm spring, with windscreens again splattered with bugs and butterflies fluttering all over the place just like the old days, but not a turning of the ecological corner.



Life in my garden supports this. Certainly, there have been huge numbers of butterflies. One evening on my several buddleia there was a cloud of butterflies, so many whites that it looked like a summer snowstorm. In among them Commas, Peacocks and a few Red Admirals, Meadow Browns and Gatekeepers. Commas and Gatekeepers especially have done very well. Ringlet is usually rare but many more this summer; I even released one caught in the greenhouse. More Speckled Wood and Brimstones too.

My Purple Hairstreaks appeared again, not many, but they were there, dancing around the tops of the oaks and more active in the evening. Skippers were very few, just a couple of Large Skippers in the veg patch. Hummingbird Hawk Moth I saw in other gardens, but not mine this time

It was not all good news though. Once again, I had no Small Tortoiseshell and no Painted Lady. That's three summers now with no Small Tortoiseshell in the garden or even on my local travels, so I think I'm saying it has now gone from the area.

One big surprise though, a first for the garden. A White Admiral. Slightly larger than the Red Admiral, with a more leisurely often gliding flight. I have seen them in Chalkney Wood, which is not far away I suppose, but never in the garden, and there it was on the brambles. I hurried indoors to get the camera, but of course by the time I got back....

The House Martins have done pretty well. Eight nests this year, and with this number of nests there will always be casualties, but perhaps because the bugs provided a bigger feast and the weather was hot, there have been very few this year. They're well into the second brood now.

Birds too provided a first for the garden. A Grey Wagtail was on the lawn a couple of times inn July. Yes I've seen them often along in the river, but never in the garden before. The last Cuckoo called on 11th June, and this year I still had not seen one until exactly one month later I followed one in the car flying along the bank section of Lane Road. Otherwise, apart from a Blackcap singing in mid-July birdsong has died down completely.

The annual trip to Minsmere this year gave three things. I saw a Bittern flying for a few seconds from one reedbed to another. Then a great view of a Mediterranean Gull in full adult plumage, snoozing on a bank. It has a true black head, unlike the Black-headed Gulls around it which actually have chocolate brown heads. It also has a large very red bill, and looks generally whiter. Like Egrets, rare a few years ago but spreading, Mediterranean Gull is widely resident now on our estuaries.

Lastly, a glimpse of Sizewell C, where construction is now in full swing, and the Bitterns must be concerned about the bulky encroachment. The first commercial law of nuclear plants is that they cost substantially more that the first, second and third estimates, and that they take much longer to build than first announced. The Sizewell C website does give the cost (£38 billion) but has forgotten to mention when the plant will start up. Which I take that to mean it won't be generating before 2040. The other risk here is technology change, because when Rolls finally gets its small-modular reactors rolling out, a £38 bn (plus, plus) 3.2 GW behemoth in Suffolk will look like a clumsy decision. Government should have asked the Bitterns.

Fingringhoe provided some relief from this gloom, not with variety but with volume of birds. The tide was in and the waders were concentrated in resting flocks on the sea-wall rather than dispersed over the mud. 250 Black-tailed Godwits (some still in summer plumage red), 50 each of Greenshank, Grey Plover and Avocet standing around waiting for the tide to turn. When I've seen Greenshanks before it's always been in ones and twos, never 50.

These included Chris Green who ran Network South East, Mike Lamport from the National Railway 200 organisation, Martin Beable Managing Director Greater Anglia and his colleagues Alan Neville and Jonathan Denby, David Jordan Chief Operating Officer Angel Trains, Nigel Spencer Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Essex, Sir Bob Russell High Steward of Colchester, The Mayor of Colchester, Bernard Jenkin MP, Paul Webster Community Rail Network and Support Officer, and Nick Atkinson Chair of our local Community Rail Partnership. All were very complimentary about our village, the station, and the work of the museum volunteers

who are preserving our rail heritage. Chris Green enjoyed the train journey from Marks Tey to Sudbury so much he did it twice!

Children from the school played a key role in the opening ceremony, singing beautifully. It must have been a surprise to find themselves singing in



front of so many people. After the speeches Chris Green, Martin Beable, Nigel Spencer and two Life Ambassadors from the school cut the ribbons and declared the new Exhibition Hall open. This building is full of fascinating exhibits, information and attractions for children. Chappel and Wakes Colne Station and Railway line played a key role in World War II, more than most of us probably realise.


It is not possible to mention all the fun activities that were available on the museum site that day to entertain everyone. We know that children and parents alike enjoyed making the rag flags, weaving, printing and playing railway themed noughts and crosses with the artist in residence. In the Thompson building children's excellent work about walks to school, and models of railway engines, and the local line and its landmarks are on display. Once the British Transport Police Car had completed its urgent mission in the morning, children really enjoyed exploring it and talking to the policemen about their work.

The Essex and South Suffolk Community Rail Partnership (ESSCRP) continues to support events in our locality, including the artist at the July 13th event, and the 1980s music train that ran from Marks Tey to Sudbury twice on 12th July. The disc jockey played lots of music we all remembered. There was dancing in the aisle and the odd look or wave from other passengers as they left the train. Money raised from the sale of refreshments is going to a cancer charity.

The ESSCRP is also working with us to improve the station following the visit from the Norfolk Wildlife Trust. We are planning to put a living roof over the bicycle rack, plus a water butt to collect the water that runs off it. Over the winter we plan to build a stag beetle pyramid with the help of Railscape, and install a reptile hibernaculum for reptiles and small creatures to hibernate in. Children at the school have painted some amazing pictures based on the work of Georgia O'Keefe. The ESSCRP is going to print these on weatherproof board so that we can display them at the station.





Coping with climate change in **Chappel and Wakes Colne**

The Head Gardener at Braxted Park, Andrea, a friend of mine, recently left her job to set up her own business, and spent a day working on my neglected garden to great effect. She gave me some excellent advice which I'd like to share with you.

Autumn is the time to plant, not spring. Planting in autumn gives plants time to establish their roots so they get off to a good start when the weather warms in spring. If you have space in your garden,




or something that you no longer like, or have passed its best, now is the time to replace it with something more suitable. Your best chance of success is to look for something that will be happy where you put it, so think about how wet or dry that area is, and how hot and sunny, or shaded, before buying something that looks lovely in the perfect care of the garden centre, but which may never recover from the shock of being planted in the wrong place. This is a great opportunity to help wildlife by choosing plants that are good for pollinators. If you like butterflies, look for single, not double, flowers so that insects can get to the nectar. A garden full of flowers is beautiful, but adding a sprinkling of bees and butterflies adds magic. It's now very difficult to predict how our seasons will turn out, but we are likely to keep seeing more wet, mild winters and hot, dry summers, so that's also something to bear in mind when choosing plants.

First prepare your soil, make sure its moist and weed free. Put cardboard and grass cuttings on weeds to block out the light to discourage growth till you have time to clear it back to bare earth. This is also a great way to keep weeds down between plants, much better than expensive geotextile material. I know from bitter experience that weeds happily grow through that and are then much harder to remove. The cardboard will rot over time, enriching the soil and is easily replaced at no cost. Plenty of cardboard arrives in our homes as packaging, we don't need to buy it! A covering of grass cuttings keeps the cardboard in place and looks natural, also improving your soil, helping it to retain more moisture.

We've been lucky this year not to have a hosepipe ban such as other regions have suffered, but the long, hot, dry spells have highlighted the need for as much water storage as you can fit in. This is definitely the time to ensure every downpipe has a water butt. Those heavy showers refilled our butts quickly, making it possible to water with rainwater all summer despite the drought. Andrea's final tips are: - Don't try to grow bedding plants in borders, our climate is really no longer suitable. Grow bedding plants in pots, with a water tray beneath, for when the compost has dried out too much to retain moisture. And leave seed heads for wildlife, don't over tidy your garden. Lots of the tiny wildlife in our gardens are helping us, improving our soil, or predating on pests, so don't clear away all their homes! Wakes Colne Parish Council

In the last issue of the Village Reporter, we reported that the City Council had delayed sending out its proposed new Local Plan housing allocations for consultation until further work had been carried out on the provision of the



necessary infrastructure. Since then a further delay has been announced until December. This poses the question as to whether the proposals will be modified, up or down, bearing in mind continuing pressure from government to provide more housing. For this reason, the parish council will delay consulting residents on the proposals until the formal consultation period finally starts.

Residents will have seen the new traffic Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) operating on the A1124 outside the Village Hall and in Station Road. They do seem to have had an effect on vehicle speed. In addition, they are supplying excellent data on number and speed of vehicles that can be used when demonstrating the problem we have with traffic through the village. We thank Paul Stocker for his hard work getting these devices up and running.

As I write there are serious delays and congestion due to a burst water main by the viaduct. This is having serious consequences for local residents. Much of the problem lies with poor signage and this has been pointed out to the authorities. We are trying to ensure a similar situation does not occur again.

Our Wakes Colne Parish website is undergoing a facelift and we thank Cllr Barry Walsh for the time and effort he is putting into this. In the meantime we continue to communicate news and information via the parish notice boards and the Facebook Group.

The parish council gives an annual award to an individual who has made a significant contribution to the community. Last year this went to Tony Langley for all he had done over the years for the village and in particular, the school. Nominations are open for this year's award.

It is very important to the Council that we do our best to help keep our footpaths clear for walkers. Our Footpath Working Group are looking for volunteers, so if you are interested and think you could give up an hour here or there to be in the fresh air, please do contact Nandita, our Clerk, or myself to register your interest. Likewise, we are still looking for new council members, so if you would like to know what is involved, do please get in touch with me for a chat.


