

Dear Residents,

Essex County Council's Climate Commission has created a Climate Focus Area (CFA) in Essex. The CFA is a demonstration site for best practice in climate change adaptation and mitigation. The main objective of the CFA is to reach net zero as soon as possible. The area identified is the catchment area of the Colne and The Blackwater, so our back yard. One CFA initiative is to encourage community renewable energy schemes to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels and cut energy bills.

40% of UK emissions now come from households.

A project entitled South East New Energy (SENE) is being part-funded by the European Regional Development Fund. It is led by the University of East London and delivered by Essex and Kent County Councils as well as a range of specialist organisations.

The SENE project helps local communities to work together to identify opportunities to generate their own cheaper renewable energy. SENE provides data in the form of a solar survey which identifies where energy generation opportunities exist, followed by a feasibility study which examines how those opportunities can be pursued, including how new business models will enable installation of solar PV at no **upfront cost to households**, reduce our reliance on the national grid, and to become net zero in a shorter space of time. Rather than fields of solar panels the "solar farm" becomes our own roofs, with some ground mounted panels on small parcels of land.

The proposed area is White Colne, Wakes Colne, Chappel and Great Tey. Using data already in the public domain, a geospatial analysis has been carried out. This has identified which buildings and land, whether commercial or domestic, are best suited for solar panels. A feasibility study is now under way and once completed will inform a special public meeting in

White Colne Village Hall on March 22nd at 7.30pm.

We had hoped to hold this meeting in Chappel Village Hall, but we will need broadband for all speakers to join us, to make the meeting accessible by zoom on https://us02web.zoom.us/j/89866108949, and so that all relevant data can be presented. Unfortunately Chappel Village Hall does not yet have broadband, but White Colne Village Hall does.

If the feasibility study shows potential for generating clean energy, and the community agrees, we can move the project forward. An Energy Services Company (ESCO) will use the study to raise finance in the markets. An ESCO is not like large companies such as EDF or EON, but a not-for-profit professional company well versed in financing, procurement, design and management of smart local energy systems. The householder/business will have a range of options:

Buy the solar array on your roof/land outright. Buy the systems on a 'Pay as you Use' contract (once paid for, the system becomes yours) Just buy cheaper green electricity from the ESCO

To receive the survey and feasibility study support from the SENE project we needed eligible organisations to sign up so that we can all benefit. The named company does not receive any funds nor take any risks. It is solely a requirement to access the EU support. Happily, the Browning family have nominated two of their companies, one in White Colne and the other in Great Tey. The East Anglian Railway Museum is also named as a beneficiary. We are indebted to them for allowing their businesses to be used.

So cheaper greener electricity, less reliant on the national grid, providing benefit for the community. A faster way to net zero.

The Minister writes.

THE 16th century reformer, Martin Luther, said 'God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but on trees, and flowers, and clouds and stars'.

For Christians, the heart of the Biblical gospel is the resurrection story, the miraculous events of three days in Jerusalem when Jesus' friends discovered he had - in some way inexplicable to them and to us - returned from death. Their

mourning turned to joy as they realised that their three years of following him and learning from him had not been a waste of time, and that what they had thought was the end of his mission to the world was in fact just the

Services beginning. How appropriate, then, that (at least for us in the Northern hemisphere) our celebration of the resurrection at Easter coincides with

springtime, for both draw our attention to the miracle of new life.

In spring, perhaps more than at any other time of year, we can see clearly what Luther was getting at when he pointed to the natural world as a page on which the gospel is written. When the cold hand of winter is withdrawn and the sun gently warms the earth, when the spring flowers begin to push their way up to the light, and when the dormant woods begin to wake, we are reminded again of the beauty and

goodness of the natural world.

And when the church celebrates the mystery of the resurrection, we are reminded of God's care for the beauty and preciousness of human life, and God's call to love as we are loved.

For all its turmoil and conflict, this is a good world, a world with potential, a world where there is enough for everyone. Springtime reminds us

that we are cared for; as Jesus challenges us to care.

Dear Readers,

I cannot believe that the last time I was writing this piece we were entering Advent and awaiting Christmas, it doesn't seem possible, time has just flown by. We are now entering the period of Lent which starts with Ash Wednesday which occurs on February 22nd and lasts for six weeks. It is a time of reflection, prayer, and contemplation, thinking of Jesus's time in the desert where he spent 40 days and nights reflecting, fasting, praying and listening to his father's plans for him. He was sorely tempted in the desert just as we are on occasions in our own everyday lives, but he resisted. Christians often fast themselves during Lent or give up certain foods and treats and some go on a pilgrimage. Two bishops Bishop Guli and Bishop Roger of Chelmsford and Colchester respectively are participating in a Lenten Pilgrimage and will be visiting Wakes Colne church on March 6th as part of their journey, we very much look forward to welcoming them that afternoon where prayers will be offered followed by the essential's tea and cake!! Four days later we come to Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, sad days in the Christian calendar with Jesus being tried in court and hung on a cross to die but on Easter Day when he rose from the dead we can truly celebrate that, 'Christ has died, Christ is Risen, Christ will come again', words we so often recite from our worship book at Sunday services (I will be listing all our services at both churches on this page).

ESSEX COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

Essex County Council recently had its budget meeting, where we decided on how to spend our £2 billion revenue budget and our extensive capital budget. We spend approximately 2/3 of the budget on adult and young person's social care and this continues to be a huge pressure and challenge for the council. Excellent and dignified care is an absolute priority.

However, the service that most people interact with on a day to day basis is our highway network. That is why I am pleased to have voted for an additional £9 million for highways maintenance, including for pavements, on top of a planned rise that had already been budgeted in. This increase is more than double that any other party proposed. I promised to secure a fair deal for our Highways and I am delivering on that. If you have any highways issues, please do get in touch on Cllr.lewis.barber@essex.gov.uk with details and we will do what we can to get the resources to resolve it.

I also know how important road safety and traffic management is. Yet, it can all too often be too bureaucratic, expensive and cumbersome to make those improvements. That is why we will be announcing changes in March to make it easier to deliver on those priorities.

We have managed to increase our spending on front line services this coming financial year while keeping council tax increases one of the lowest in the country. ECC's council tax will increase 3.5% with 2% of this ring-fenced for adult social care. In a time of cost of living pressures, I was determined to minimise any rises on households.

On road safety and traffic management, I am pleased to have financially supported the introduction of a new speed indicator device along on the A1124 with my locality budget. I am hopeful that at the time of print, this will have been installed to help with reducing speeds. We are also waiting for a date for the implementation of the weight restriction on Lane Road and gateway improvements in Chappel. On Station Road, I have submitted an application to the Local Highways Panel for a variable 20 mph limit to assist in safer speeds at key times. This is after my request for a full 20mph had not been supported. There will also be repairs to the soft lighting on the road to the station. I have also supported a reduction and consistent speed limit between the A120 and Chappel and Wakes Colne.

On waste, Colchester Borough Council is proposing to introduce garden waste charges and scrap the waste drop-off service. I am opposed to such proposals and I will be voting against it when the vote comes. Essex County Council is trialing a booking system for use of its recycling centres from March 13th to help cut waiting times and reduce unauthorised commercial waste. This trial is an extension of the larger vehicle booking system throughout the county and the existing all booking system in Rayleigh. The system works well in Rayleigh and Suffolk so I hope it will achieve similar results here. I have raised with the cabinet member concerns that this may cause fly tipping, but I am reassured by a recent investigation by DEFRA that concluded booking systems do not lead to such an outcome.

The A12 widening project to provide three lanes in each carriageway between Chelmsford and Marks Tey, overseen by National Highways, is progressing. Essex County Council supports the principal of the widening but has objected to National Highways' proposals for some of the junctions. There are various reasons for these objections but the main one is the impact of the junctions on increased volumes of traffic on the local road network. The £35 million investment in resurfacing the A12 between Marks Tey and Stanway has begun. The works are expected to last until late 2023/early 2024 with the road kept open by a contraflow system. We are liaising with National Highways and Essex Highways to ensure that the impact on the local road network and journeys on the A12 itself is minimised as we appreciate this is a significantly disruptive piece of work. We will keep the community updated on these two key road schemes. There is, at the time of writing, no further news on the new A120 despite some media speculation that it had been **Councillor Lewis Barber** scrapped.

We're now in preparation for the year ahead, the first game of the season is only 10 weeks away. The mild autumn has really helped our ground recover from the drought of last years' summer.

2022 was another successful season, congratulations to our $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ team, captained by Chris Carter on gaining

promotion to division 5, which is the fourth consecutive promotion. Our 2^{nd} team finished mid-table, following promotion.

I met Chris some 60 years ago when he travelled from Luton at the weekends to visit his sister Betty and Mick, who owned the village shop in Chappel near Chappel church. We would go out for the occasional drink and overtime became friends. Chris moved to Chappel in 1967 and lived in a cottage in the Street, at that time he was working for Findus as a salesman. He would park his car in my parents' driveway. I quickly realised my place as my mother would get up in the morning to de-ice his car and clean his windscreen so he could just jump in and go to work. My car was parked behind Chris' and guess what, it was still iced up and dirty. It was clear he was becoming the favourite one! In 1969 he was best man for Sue and me. In 1974 he was playing dominoes in the Swan pub with Mr Rowlands who owned the shop and post office. A deal was made and they agreed to swap premises, Chris and his family took over the shop and post office and Mr Rowlands moves into the cottage in the Street. That was the start of 48 years of service to the villages, approximately 14, 976 days. He became postmaster as well as running the shop with his wife and 2 young

daughter Louise and Katy. Chris was ahead of the times, offering the first 1974 version of on-line shopping. You would put your order in the little red book and the goods would be delivered in his lunch hour.

Chris has helped and employed lots of local people, including my daughter Sally.

In his time, he has survived two serious floods. It takes a strong person to start again and continue to be the local hub of the village. Well done, Chris.

Then roll forward to March 2020 when COVID hit and the world went into lockdown. Thank you to both Chris and Jinny for keeping everyone in village going. I don't know what we would have done without the shop being open. Thanks to Jinny for the daily 5am start, getting up to go the wholesalers to keep the shop stocked with fresh food, supplies and toilet rolls.

Nature notes

There are so many good places within easy reach of the village, and after visiting them for a first time I keep saying why haven't we been here before. One such is Welney, just beyond Ely so only a bit over an hour away. Its main fame perhaps is the wintering Whooper Swans. The reserve has an excellent huge enclosed (and heated) hide, its windows overlooking the shallow lake and marsh, and the person doing the daily midday feeding routine does a good amusing commentary about the swans and ducks white they push and shove around his wheelbarrow of grain.


We went during that early December cold period. Apart from loads of Whoopers, there were several Short-eared Owls hunting along the drainage canal bank, and a Barn Owl too. On the feeders outside the restaurant were several Tree Sparrows, quite rare birds these days, several hares out on the fields, and three Carass flew over the terrace area outside.

Locally I've seen a Barn Owl at Great Tey and several Red Kites. My feeders as usual have attracted large numbers of Goldfinches and Green Finches. Greedy birds, through binoculars you see they spill as much as they eat, and the spillage attracts the ground feeders. There have been many Chalfinches, and a single male Brambling once in January. Also a male Blackcap put in an appearance for a few days, along with a Nuthatch and a regular Great Spotted Woodpecker. Over a ten-minute period in January, while my morning coffee dribbled through the filter machine, I saw ten species—three finches, three tits, Nuthatch, Blackcap, House Sparrow and Dunnock. Also in the garden, a couple of Redwings have been foraging in the hedges, and close up you realise just how beautifully patterned they are.

Over at Abberton, a Smew had been reported. I was driving to Mersea to pick up some oysters one January morning, and stopped off to try to see it. 08.30, no-one around and no birds either on the water apart from a few distant swans. I watched for 2 minutes, nothing happening, hand on car door to go, and then a single

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






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Bee Lines



When I heard that The Reporter was moving from six to four issues per year I thought that the increased interval would give me plenty of time to contemplate what to include in the next issue. Not so, as the time has simply flown past.

Firstly, we had Christmas, free of Covid and its restrictions for the first year in several. Joy, however, turned to despair when the whole family tested positive for Covid shortly after Boxing Day. So much for my happy new year!

The bees have had it easier, as they often seem to do. Some variable weather, including hard frosts and lots of rain have kept them largely confined to their hives for much of the time. It is always a concern at such times as to whether there is still life within the hives, but the vigilant beekeeper can read a few signs which might reassure him.

The first thing to look for is the presence of dead bees outside the hive. A few bees will die most days, but they will be ejected from the hive by the undertaker bees. On warm days, the corpses will be removed some distance, but on colder days they will simply be kicked out of the entrance. The local blue tits and sparrows will soon clear up the bodies, but if they start to pile up, it is a sure sign that all is not well in the hive.

Another good pointer is to look underneath the hive. My hives are fitted with open mesh floors, as they are more hygienic. If stores are being used up or young bees are emerging, the wax cappings from the individual cells fall through the floor, giving a characteristic pattern on the ground below, and reassuring the keeper that there is still activity within the hive.

The ultimate test of course is to see the bees flying. They will fly on warm days if the temperature goes above about twelve degrees, although this varies from hive to hive. In early winter, these flights are usually for comfort, for bees are naturally hygienic and will not foul their nests if at all avoidable. Towards spring, they fly in search of pollen, to feed their emerging brood, and later for nectar, to sustain themselves and to store in order to begin the process of making honey.

This year, by Valentine's Day, the bees were out on the wing. They were flying from all six of my hives, in varying numbers. I thought it was a little early for them to be collecting pollen, but sure enough, a few were returning with the tell-tale sight of full pollen baskets on their back legs.

The colour of pollen varies between plant species, so it would appear that my bees had found sources from snowdrops, a burnt red colour, and the yellow pollen of hazel catkins, amongst others. This is the most reliable indication that all is well within the hives.

Dangers still lurk, however. Woodpeckers must be guarded against, as must be mice. There seems to be an increase in the badger population over the last couple of years, and badgers are powerful enough to overturn a hive in order to consume its contents. They are also more useful in late summer, when they often dig up and destroy, by eating them, ground nests of wasps, which would otherwise try to raid the hives for their honey content.

So, all in all, it's looking pretty good at the moment. It will be another couple of months before I can take a look inside the hives to make sure all is well. Hopefully, I can report on that in the next

They review various planning applications from new housing estates, hospitals, schools, town centre regenerations to name but a few.

Design' (www.securedbydesign.com) to ensure that new planning applications have considered the impact of crime in their design.

Secured by Design (SBD) is the official police security initiative that's aims at reducing the opportunities for crime and ASB. Developers around the UK can achieve SBD awards for incorporating crime prevention measures and techniques into their developments in all kinds of building sectors. SBD also developed and maintains a product-based police accreditation scheme—the Police Preferred Specification where independently tested security products and building material can be found.

In conclusion crime prevention is not just reactive and concerned with just the here and now, its core is around creating safer and exclusive places for everyone at all times.

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

YOUR PARISH COUNCIL WORKING FOR YOUR PARISH

Chairwoman's report. February 2023

Towards the end of the council year in April and the beginning of a new one in May there are a few relatively good news items, the usual works in progress and some dates for your diaries.

Residents will be pleased to know that the precept for Wakes Colne has been set so that there will be no increase to households in that part of the community charge. As I write, we do not yet know of Colchester City Council's (CCC) or Essex County Council's (ECC) charges.

At last, after deciding to purchase a Vehicle Activated System in October 2021, and finally obtaining the necessary permissions from ECC for its location and the pole installation, outside the village hall where the Speed Watch team do checks, we have been able to place an order for the device. As there is a 4–6-week lead in time, it may be connected in April.

Also, after many months without a councillor, we have been able to co-opt Frances Hounslow. We welcome her, with her knowledge and love of Wakes Colne, to the team of seven.

Several matters are still ongoing: we await the flooding alert signage promised by ECC for Chappel Corner by the Post Office, and the Unsuitable for Heavy Vehicle signage for each end of Lane Rd; replacement of the solar lighting in Station Approach, should be undertaken by Greater Anglia; the solar light at the bus stop on the village hall side has been removed to investigate repair; a revised, updated, local walks booklet, including the new walk safely up Tyburn Hill, is in progress and, on publication, will be made available for free to residents.

We should be grateful for your help in replenishing the book stock in the telephone book exchanges; please leave just a few at a time; they will then be stamped. A small team plans to replant the four planters at the bus shelters in May. We should welcome help with watering during the summer months; there are water butts and watering cans at each location. Please contact the parish clerk (parishclerk@wakescolne.org) if you would be willing to be added to a watering rota.

Dates for your diaries:

From 13th March it will be necessary to book a visit to any ECC recycling centre to deposit waste. The booking system will be available online from 27th February on the CCC website. Residents are being asked to report any fly tipping on the website.

A public meeting on Solar Energy is being organised by Jill Bruce, our local Climate Change Ambassador, in White Colne village hall on 22nd March at 19.30.

The annual parish meeting, organised this year by Wakes Colne Parish Council (WCPC), is an opportunity for both WCPC and Chappel Parish Council to make an annual public report and to hear about the activities and events of all the local organisations represented. We cordially invite the organisations, residents who kindly undertake tasks which improve our community, and villagers to share in this event on 26th April at 19.15 in the village hall, where we shall celebrate all the many contributions with refreshments.

Further ahead, the Memories Project, which is recording residents' memories of living here over the decades and collecting memorabilia, will hold another get together on 20th July in the village hall. The team will report back on progress to date and offer opportunities for villagers to share their recollections together and with us. Work is proceeding steadily as we uncover a lot of local history to be lodged at the Essex Records Office and the University of Essex and select key material for a booklet. If you would like to make a contribution please contact the parish clerk (parishclerk@wakescolne.org).

Finally, by early April parish councillors will need to register for the local elections to be held on May $4^{\rm th}$. As my colleagues have been aware for some time, I shall not be standing again for election. Having been elected to WCPC in January 2012 and been its Chairwoman for the last 2.5 years it has been a privilege to serve the village I have had a strong connection with for over 60 years. Serving in this voluntary capacity is frustrating in that nothing happens quickly or straightforwardly, determination and attention to detail are required; given that individuals' interests are often concerned, decisions can be controversial and there can be more brickbats, from which there is little redress, than support or even plaudits; but there are also opportunities for creative projects to benefit and take care of the community. I trust that my colleagues will go forward from strength to strength with the roles we have put in place to address, with due consideration and fairness, the responsibilities which the council has placed upon it.
