



Chappel Viaduct was built by Peter Bruff between 1847 and 1849 for the Colchester, Stour Valley, Sudbury and Halstead Railway, later part of the Great Eastern Railway, It consists of 32 arches of 9.1m spans, is 320m long and has a maximum height of 23m. It is made of 7 million bricks which were fired locally at Bures.

This pack contains 32 postcard reproductions of watercolours by the artist Władysław Miręcki showing each arch of Chappel Viaduct on its western facade. Each original measures 54 x 36cm and is painted on 638gsm Saunders Waterford CP (NOT) paper. They were painted between 2020 and 2022.

Władysław Mirecki was born in Chelmsford in 1956 of Polish parentage. He is a self-taught artist having painted all his life including during attaining his Science Degree, as an industrial designer and as a co-proprietor of Chappel Galleries since 1986. His work has recently been acquired by the National Railway Museum, York and the Fitzwilliam Museum, Cambridge as part of their permanent collections.

# The Minister writes . . .

'You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1:8)

In Luke's narrative, these are the last words spoken by the resurrected Jesus before he finally leaves his followers. Luke uses the episode to provide continuity with the end of his gospel – a kind of 'previously in the Good News...' He tells the disciples what to do, where to do it, and how it can be done. They are to be witnesses; they are to witness everywhere; and they will do so in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Several questions come to mind, the first of which is 'what exactly does being a witness to Christ involve?' The word 'witness' is almost always used in a legal context. A witness is someone who gives testimony in court by telling of what they have seen; a witness can also be someone who signs a legal document to testify that it is genuine. At its simplest, a witness is someone who has seen something and tells of what they have seen.

For those who knew Jesus, and shared the immediate experiences of the resurrection, that would not be too difficult. A little later in the book of Acts, we find Peter saying. *'This Jesus, God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses.'* It seems that the disciples took their mission seriously and did what they had been told. They *witnessed.* They related what they had seen.

Our instructions are not quite so clear. If we want to be witnesses to Christ then we have to give a little thought to what that means. We are assured of the constant presence of the Holy Spirit, and we know that there are Christians all over the world – so the how and the where can be achieved. But we must ask ourselves, What

have we seen? How has our faith changed our lives? What does Jesus mean to me? And having thought about it, and pondered the questions – tell someone!



# A prayer . . .

Holy Spirit of God – wake us up! Release your gifts among your people, so that together we may have all we need to be effective and fruitful. Empower us to take the good news of Jesus out into our communities to bring transformation and hope.

## Colne Valley Community Energy Project Next meeting Earls Colne Constitutional Club Club, York Road CO6 2RN 7.30pm Monday 26th June

I'm delighted to report we are making excellent progress in bringing solar panels and batteries to all in Chappel and Wakes Colne who would like to benefit from more affordable energy bills with a lower carbon footprint. We already have about 50 email addresses of those interested. If you are interested and haven't received an email from me, please let me know at jillbruce321@gmail.com

If you have the spare cash of course you can just go ahead and have solar panels and batteries installed yourself, but if you choose to join the community project you will benefit from discounts achieved through economies of scale, know that Essex County Council will have conducted due diligence on the companies chosen to do the work, and be able to export your surplus energy to our community instead of to your energy company.

For those who prefer to have them installed for free, and benefit from discounted energy bills, we are looking for a total of 300 homes to attract the necessary inward investment, so we have expanded our scope to include Chappel, Wakes Colne, White Colne, Great Tey, Earls Colne and Colne Engaine. Cherry Mckean, co-owner of Ecolnes Refillery, Earls Colne, will be leading on the project in Earls Colne and Colne Engaine.

We've talked to Colne Engaine and Earls Colne Parish Councils, who both voted unanimously in favour of supporting the project and are doing all they can to let their residents know about it. We plan to speak to Great Tey Parish Council in June

## Are You Low on Energy?

The war in Ukraine and the cost of living have highlighted concerns around energy security and cost, which has further brought the issues of global warming and renewable energy into sharp focus. As a result, there is growing interest in 'green' technologies – solar panels, heat pumps, electric vehicles etc. You may well already have one or more of these and if you're considering solar panels, I would highly recommend getting involved in the community project (contact Jill Bruce - jillbruce321@gmail.com).

I'm involved in a sustainability project at Colchester Garrison and our aim is to help the MOD reach their target of becoming Net Zero by 2050. What we have learnt is the path to greener energy and lower bills doesn't necessarily start with heavy investment in the newest 'green' technologies, it starts with user behaviour.

For waste we have become familiar with the advice to Reduce – Re-use – Recycle. For energy there is a similar approach:

**Avoid** – Don't do what you were going to do – hang the washing on the line rather than use the tumble dryer.

**Reduce** – Use less energy –an 'eco' setting, lower temperature wash, turn down the thermostat.

Restore – Use a renewable energy (e.g. solar panels).

The principle is that we should first try to lower our energy usage to minimise the amount of renewable generation required to meet our needs, which of course results in lower utility bills.

Below are some rough costs to run standard household appliances (data from energyguide.org.uk). The actual cost will depend on your energy tariff and the power rating of the appliance, but it is helpful as a guide:

Hot Tub - £1.06 per hour, Tumble dryer – 85p per hour, Washing machine – 71p per hour, Oven – 71p per hour, Hob – 61p per hour Dishwasher – 39p per hour, Microwave 34p per hour and Kettle – 3p for a 2-minute boil

The numbers speak for themselves but as an example if you run the washing machine 6 times a week on a standard 2-hour wash this will cost you around £440 a year in electric. If you have an 'Eco' or 'Quick' setting on the machine and can get each wash done in an hour that's over £200 saved in a year which will pretty much pay for both Netflix and Disney+ (non-negotiables in our house!). And of course, the washing gets finished in half the time!

LED lights also provide potentially significant savings – a 60W incandescent (filament) bulb will cost about 40p an hour to run, energy saving bulbs (which look like a mini fluorescent tube) are typically 15W so cost 10p an hour. LED bulbs are around 7W so 5p an hour to run (and don't have the warm-up period of energy saving bulbs). This is a 90% saving against the cost of a filament bulb and half that of an energy saving bulb.

There are plenty of other examples of how you can easily reduce your household energy demands – from only boiling as much water as you need rather than filling up the kettle, to checking the timers on outside lights so they are not coming on in 'winter' mode when it isn't getting dark until 9pm. Green technologies are the future but saving energy (and money) now will help us to transition away from fossil fuels. Alan Cochram

## **Chappel and Wakes Colne Station Adopters Group**

At the time of writing, the groundworks at the station are coming to an end. The construction workers have been very helpful to the station adopters. They have understood our frustrations in wanting to maintain and develop the attractiveness of the station while the work was underway. The planters on the platform have looked very pretty.



With the backing of Greater Anglia and the government, land around the stations in East Anglia is being developed to attract bees and natural wildlife. The approach close to the station has been designated an area for natural diversity. Our thanks go to the East Anglian Railway Museum (EARM) Volunteers who have put up the notices to show that this is the case, and that the area is maintained by station adopters. Earlier in the year, young children, and their parent helpers, sewed wildflower seeds, and are now beginning to see the results of their efforts. There are plans for, Railscape, Greater Anglia landscapers, to plant wildflowers on the slope to the right of the EARM entrance, once the ground work is complete.

Plans to enhance the area around the talking bench have been placed on hold. They will move forward as soon as the area is clear, making this an even more pleasing place to sit and enjoy the environment.

Our thanks go to the children in the village school for painting new, exceptional pictures to display on the station platform as soon as the contractors have finished. These will replace the current pictures about bees, which will still be displayed in another part of the station.

In the autumn we plan to have a coffee morning where you, with members of the family can help to plant spring bulbs, and contribute to making the station attractive. More information nearer the date when details have been finalised.

## Nature notes May 2023

Despite the cold wet weather of early spring, some summer visitor birds made it with only a little delay. Our House Martins were back on 16<sup>th</sup> April (11<sup>th</sup> April last year) and Nightingales were singing at Abberton on 16<sup>th</sup> April, perhaps a couple of days later than usual. On the other hand, I didn't hear a Cuckoo around the village until 3<sup>rd</sup> May (13<sup>th</sup> April last year).

One benefit of the wet weather was that winter birds were late leaving. And that brings me on to wildlife spectacles. Not the known ones at well-known places for things like Starling or wader murmuration, great though they are, but the unexpected ones. I've had three recently, all very different, all unexpected, and all very memorable.

The first was in the garden under the feeders. Brambling is a rare visitor and in the last few years I've had one or two paying very short visits only a couple of times each winter. On 8<sup>th</sup> April, which is getting very late for Bramblings as they've usually set off for the top of Norway and beyond by then, there was a fine bright male under the feeders mopping up the crumbs of nuts spilt by the messy eaters above. Then a female, then another couple of males, and in the end, there were six, a record for my garden. Four males in varying states of change from winter to bright summer plumage, two females, and, they stayed around for most of the day. They are ground feeding finches, and were joined by several Chaffinches, while above on the feeders were 8 Goldfinches and 6 Greenfinches. A finch spectacular, and enhanced by one fine male Reed Bunting joining the gang on the ground for a while.

I don't normally talk about holidays, but I've just been to northern Greece and there were two spectacles there from birds which do occasionally make it to the UK in very small numbers each year. With global warming they might become more frequent visitors or even breeders in the case of the Tit.

Pratincole is an odd name for an odd bird, one that fires the imagination when leafing through the guide books. It is an exotic looking thing, mostly sandy brown, with a yellow black-bordered throat. The oddity is why is it in the wader classification, when it looks nothing like a wader. On the ground, it looks more like a small tern, and it feeds by hunting acrobatically for insects Swallow-like rather than probing around on the mud for worms. It is in effect a giant Swallow, long winged and with tail streamers.

Unusually, we'd seen none during the trip, and then over a field of poppies and buttercups there were suddenly 50 swooping around. There must have just been a hatch of flies which attracted them. In the crowd there were a few Hobbies and Swifts too, and they all zipped around for half an hour or so until the show suddenly ended as they all dispersed. They'd been flying so close that at one point my hat was almost pierced by a passing Pratincole. Spectacular stuff.

Once they'd gone, a colleague heard a Penduline Tit. Scanning for it, I couldn't see it, but I did find its nest. Penduline Tit weaves its pouch-shaped nest from fine hairy vegetation, the structure hanging from a branch by a thin woven thread. From a distance a precarious round ball on the end of a string. This nest was not finished in that the narrow opening hole was not there yet. The tiny bird, smaller than a Long-tailed Tit, then appeared, hopped into the incomplete nest and started to weave away. Magical stuff, and a true spectacle.

Back home and again at Abberton, the wet early spring had created a shallow lake in farmland opposite the reservoir. Many waders were on it: on the day I went many Ruff (one in near-breeding plumage finery with a white head and neck), a few Greenshanks, a Little-ringed Plover and the star attraction of a Pectoral Sandpiper. A visitor from North America, the few that make it over usually come in the autumn, so this was an unusual find and had attracted many birdwatchers in the week it was there. All very nice, yet not quite there in the spectacle category.

## Bee Lines



As the Winter moved coldly towards spring, we fled these shores for a few days, seeking warmer sanctuary on the island of Malta. It was my first time there, and I must confess, I was very impressed.

Malta is by far the most "British" of the Mediterranean islands, boasting red telephone and pillar boxes, car tax discs and English (and Maltese) as the official language. They even drive on "our" side of

the road. The weather was warm as well, but not too hot when we were there in early March.

Overall, the island represented excellent value for money, and of course, there was also some honey, as pictured.

I have to admit, this honey was delicious, but in this country, the labelling would be considered misleading, by nature of the word, "raw".

The regulations on labelling honey sold in the UK are fairly clear. It must contain the brand name, the address of the producer, the country or countries of origin, an expiry date and in some circumstances, a batch number. There is no legal definition of the word "raw" in relation to honey, so the use of such a term is not allowed.

The other contentious term is "organic" as although there is a legally allowed definition of organic when used for crops or vegetables, bees will forage over a wide area, and there is really nowhere in mainland UK where the bees will be guaranteed to have collected their nectar from only certified organic sources.

However, a visit to a well-known local supermarket revealed both organic and raw honeys on the shelf. Further searches online turned up companies claiming that "their" honey might well enhance your sleep, help with your allergies, in particular hay fever, boost your immune system and even delay the onset of dementia. All of these claims, as far as I can tell, are unproven; so, who is responsible to investigate and potentially prosecute the wrong doers?

This task rests firmly with the local authority in their responsibility for Trading Standards enforcement in their respective areas. The snag, of, course, is that local authority funding has been heavily cut over recent years; there are much bigger issues than honey labelling, and most Trading Standards officers are far too busy to address the issue. When you also consider that the more outlandish health boosting claims are made by internet-based companies, it is often unclear as to exactly where they are based, and therefore which local authority should be investigating.


Does this really matter? I hear you ask. Well, when you consider the enormous prices charged for some of these online products, it probably does. If you think that these honeys really work for you, and you can afford them, then all is well and good, but please be aware that there is no definitive proof for any of these claims, so selling on these terms must, at the very least, be considered as sharp practice.

To consider the other side of this particular coin, the retail price of our locally produced honey has been dragged down for years by the insistence of major retailers in importing cheap processed honey in bulk from overseas producers and selling it at well below the manufacturing cost of UK producers. Unfortunately, on testing, much of this imported bulk honey has been found to be adulterated with large volumes of corn or sugar syrup, and even in some cases contain residues of pesticides that are banned in the E.U. and U.K.

So, unless the regulations are tightened, and then enforced, it remains a case of "buyer beware" and we must remember that if price looks too good to be true, it probably is, and this applies to both overly cheap and expensive, overly hyped honeys in equal measure.

As a mere hobbyist producer, the whole issue makes little difference to me, as I do not need to make a big profit on my honey sales, but I do feel for the mid-sized bee farmers who are caught up in the middle of this cost versus price dilemma, desperately trying to add value in the eyes of the public to a product which is so much superior to the regular cheap supermarket offerings, yet at face value, appears identical. For the major importers and retailers, however, I have no sympathy at all. Here endeth the rant for now. I hope to talk more about my own bees in

the next issue.

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
